### FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear friends of Vermont CARES,

Vermont CARES achieves profound individual results, whether through connecting to a vital medication or secure home, preventing overdose, or telling someone their HIV status with compassion and clear steps to manage their health. Doing so this past eight months, with a structural focus on the connections between the HIV epidemic and the COVID-19 epidemic, has been a profound challenge and a deep honor.

Those local results are not small: they're often huge, consequential, and life-changing. From one-on-one conversations, we network with families, employers, and rural communities requesting HIV prevention and harm reduction. These encounters reach thousands of Vermonters each year, in trainings aimed at reducing stigma, how to use Naloxone to prevent overdose, or how to be present for loved ones with HIV.

We've seen this so starkly as yet another global pandemic layered on top of our HIV and opioid epidemics. And those we work alongside, as clients and program participants and volunteers, remain steady leaders who exemplify care and connection. Experiencing this resilience in action, in such acute crisis, inspires us all each day.

Now, additionally, we face another serious crisis: the State of Vermont is needing to enact deep budget cuts, which will affect our agency in profound ways starting on January 1st, 2021. While funding always vacillates, those we serve – at risk of, or living with, HIV or substance use disorder – deserve stability. Our case managers are often sole connections outside the home for healthcare access, food, or supplies to stay safe and alive.

We've told you in prior year-end letters that Vermont is leading the nation in HIV care, in preventing new transmission of the virus, and in housing our neighbors with the virus. Comparable impacts are unfolding in our expanding harm reduction and syringe service program as we keep our communities safe while building genuine and deep relationships, encouraging self-worth and self-care.

We cannot afford to backslide on these successes now. We cannot enable a sharper impact of HIV, substance use disorder, and overdose fatality to rise in our state because of factors of tens of thousands of dollars. The impact is too clear, the work is too refined, and the populations we serve too vulnerable and valuable. We need your help, and the help of thousands of other Vermonters, today.

This report explains the ways in which we have evolved, the impacts we have made, and the good work so many of our neighbors and allies make possible.

Though we're socially distanced, our work connects us closely, and there are profound ways all of us can stay involved in harm reduction, HIV care, and prevention. #### HARM REDUCTION



- 350 People Served, over 1385 visits
- 447,572 Syringes distributed




